Amber Calistro is esponding well to treatment Immunology the esearching Centre in the ahamas. "Therapy is lling the tumor," said the hild's mother in a recent blegram. But "Amber's pirits are low."

Amber, who is four years d, has cancer. She has gone the Bahamas, with her other Patti Calistro, to the cancer which began a lump behind her ear.

The treatment they have sought is experimental therapy that augments the cancer-fighting capabilities of the immune mechanism. Amber is under the care of Dr. Lawrence Burton, director of the center.

Two Jonathan Law High School students have coordinated a fund raiser for Amber. Their efforts have raised \$850 for her treatment

Janis Donaldson and Ann Iacozza, Amber's former babysitter, sold raffle tickets

to Milford citizens. In a Sunday drawing, Debbie Guard won 50 gallons of gasoline redeemable at Souza's Arco Station at 360 Naugatuck Ave. The three girls will be graduating from Law this June.

"We'd like to thank all those who supported the raffle." said Miss Donaldson. "The money will go to the Amber Calistro Fund."

The Amber Calistro Fund has been established at the Colonial Bank, Baybrook Office, 20 Ocean Ave., West Haven 06516. Any store owners who have cannisters with funds for Amber may mail the donations to the Fund at the bank, according to Michael Calistro, Amber's father.

"I'll be going around to the shops to pick up the money in the cannisters on a periodic basis," Calistro said. "For those people who would

with conventional medical treatment, has sought immuno-therapy for Amber in the Bahamas because she feels it is more natural and less destructive than conventional treatment that is offered in this country.

"There have been no side effects and Amber's energy is high," said Ms. Calistro in a May 27 letter.

A woman who wishes her identity to remain anonymous, donated \$3,000 for living expenses while they stay in the Bahamas. "We couldn't have made the choice we did without her help," Ms. Calistro said.
